Scorton Community Speed Watch

Update on the "Save Our Swale" project

Originally sparked by concerns about raw sewage in the river, the Save Our Swale (SOS) Project has been sampling the water quality of the Swale since 2023. SOS volunteers have sampled at eight sites from Grinton downstream to check for chemical (nitrate and phosphate) and bacterial pollution. The nearest site to Scorton is at Brompton which regularly has the highest pollution levels of any of our sampling locations. In addition to carrying out our own analysis, we're also taking part in a national sampling programme focused on bacterial pollution, including the potentially most harmful kind (E.coli). Nearly 90% of the samples we've taken have exceeded the safe bathing limit for E.coli.

The main sources of bacterial pollution in the Swale below Richmond are almost certainly the two Sewage Treatment Works (STWs) at Easby and Colburn. As a result of our findings, SOS is actively pressurising Yorkshire Water to upgrade these facilities. The main cause of the excessive amounts of algae we now regularly see in the river is nitrate and phosphate pollution, arising from a combination of STW discharges and runoff from farmland.

To gain a wider understanding of the impact of pollution, SOS has also begun sampling aquatic life in the river, not in this case fish, but the tiny creatures such as caddis and mayfly larva and freshwater shrimps. These are the main food source for many species of fish and some birds such as dippers. It was no surprise to find that the early results of our Brompton survey show very low levels of these aquatic creatures. This could be a reason why what up to 4-5 years ago was a thriving population of dippers, has disappeared from the river at Brompton.

Having collected all this evidence and following an SOS visit to the Richmond Works in March, we've contacted Yorkshire Water's head office in Leeds to complain about the outdated and poorly maintained equipment on the site which clearly cannot cope with current quantities of sewage. As a result, we continue to see discharges of raw sewage into our beautiful river, in clear breach of Environment Agency regulations. The local and regional press have picked up on SOS complaints and we intend to keep up as much pressure as we can on Yorkshire Water until we see some real increases in capital investment and improvements in their performance. We will also keep on recording both pollution levels and aquatic life and we're grateful to both Brompton and Scorton Parish Councils for the help they gave us in buying the equipment needed to carry out our work.

BOOZY CAKE (COFFEE LIQUOR): RECIPE & INSTRUCTIONS INGREDIENTS

4 medium eggs (separated), 160g caster sugar, 150g butter (softened), 40ml strong espresso (cooled), 160g plain flour, 1 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 25g cocoa powder, 50ml of coffee liquor to soak

TOPPING: 150mg mascarpone, 2 tbsp coffee liquor, 50g icing

METHOD:

- Preheat the oven to fan 170g. Beat the egg yolk, sugar, butter and 1) espresso until they become smooth and pale. Mix the flour, bicarbonate of soda and cocoa powder until just combined.
- 2) Whisk the egg whites to stiff peaks, then mix a third into the batter. Gently fold in the remaining egg white until no more is visible. Transfer the mixture to the prepared loaf tin, smooth down the top and bake for 25 - 30 minutes, the cake is ready when it springs back when touched.
- After removing from the oven, allow the cake to cool in the tin for 10 3) minutes before evenly spooning the coffee liquor over the top, then turn the cake out onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 4) To make the icing, whisk together the mascarpone, coffee liquor and icing sugar and artfully pile on top of the cake once cooled. Decorate with chocolate, coffee beans or shavings.

Scorton Lakes - a great success story but now under threat!



Since the end of quarrying, the incredible development around Scorton Lakes has led to the area becoming a tranquil place, valued for its nature and wildlife as well as for its overall community amenity value. The restoration and nature areas are enjoyed not only by bird watchers and naturalists, but others who come from a wide area for the sites leisure and well-being value. Each week hundreds of people of all ages visit the lakes to walk, run, horse ride, take their dogs for a walk, meet up with friends and family, connect with nature or simply to be in a beautiful, peaceful environment.

However, all of this is now under threat as proposals to build hundreds of holiday homes and apartments around the lakes are imminent. This would result in this important wildlife habitat, its nature, community amenity and leisure space being lost. No longer will there be a natural space for people to enjoy - instead roads will replace pathways and bridleways, large lodges will block the views and birds and animals will disappear. In addition, there will also be the associated construction activities and ongoing impact on local roads.
